




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Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the eighth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Castle Creek ES serves 540 students enrolled in grades Kindergarten through Fifth. The student population's ethnicity is made of 58% Hispanic and 42% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 63% White, 25% Black, 1% Native, 6% Asian, 0% Pacific, and 4% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Alyson Muse and Assistant Principal Evangeline Slaughter.. Castle Creek ES is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include Battle of the Books, gifted education, safety patrols, VPK, performing arts, and student interest clubs.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Castle Creek ES indicates that the average age of the collection is 2008 and the number of books per student is 18. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for highly effective media centers that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection.

At this time, Castle Creek ES does meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Strength: Above recommended amount of items per student.
- Concern: Less fiction than non-fiction books in collection.
- Concern: Average age of collection is 2008.
- Concern: 49% of collection is aged.
- Concern: Only 32% of collection is diverse.
- Concern: Average age of Easy collection is 2004.
- Concern: Graphic novel collection is small compared to interest level by students.
- Concern: Only 13% of collection is newer than 5 years.

Comparison between 2021-22 and 2022-23 Testing Data

(adapted from https://www.fldoe.org/accountability/assessments/k-12-student-assessment/results/2023.stml) In 2023, the state transitioned from Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) to Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST) for English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. The 2022-23 for FAST and Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) End-of-Course (EOC) assessments are based on **provisional** achievement level cuts that are linked to each assessment's respective 2021-22 reporting scale. Comparisons should not be made between the 2023 data and previous years' data. The implementation of FAST K-2 in the 2022-23 school year was the first administration of statewide assessments for students in grades K-2. These assessments include Star Early Literacy Proficiency, Star Reading Proficiency, and Star Math Proficiency.

Collection Analysis

The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis from July 2023. Purchasing or weeding after that time is not reflected in this data.

- Newer titles for non-fiction are needed for current information, especially age-sensitive areas.
- Newer titles for fiction are needed for student interest and condition of books.
 - This collection is in need of more popular fiction, graphic novels and non-fiction books like cookbooks, cars and animals that interest students.

Data Reflection

- Aged title weeding of collection started last summer based on condition of books.
- We still have a lot of books per student which is conducive to more weeding.
- The average age of collection is still too low since most of the collection was bought when the school opened. Weeding and replacing books in all sections is still needed.
- Diverse titles are on the increase.
- Books added to collection is much lower than amount of books needed to be weeded.
